Clonmacnoise, one of Ireland's

Clonmacnoise continueed - an English garrison from Athlone finally sacked it and reduced it to a ruin.

As a monastic ruin, Clonmacnoise offers about everything you'd want to see. The site includes the remains of a monastery wall around the grounds, a cathedral, seven churches, two round towers (Page 1), three high crosses and a large collection of Early Christian grave slabs. The Irish government's Office of Public Works manages the preserved ruin. An Interpretive Centre is open to the public, the graveyard is in use and religious services take place in a modern chapel.

High Crosses stood in many of the prominent Irish monasteries. They worked like the medieval great stained-glass windows, illustrating key scenes from the bible to help the congregation learn the stories and teachings they convev.

The glory of Clonmacnoise is its three high crosses (left) dating from the 900s. It is perhaps the finest location of Irish high crosses in the world.
