#### A candle in mined. the window is a Christmas tradition that has survived and thrived in Ireland for hundreds of years.

Originally, the candle was said to welcome the Holy Family and a house without a candle was seen as unwelcoming as the

innkeeper who refused Joseph and Mary a room. Three candles were used to represent Joseph, Mary and the baby Jesus, and the door was left unlocked to let them in should they arrive after the family was asleep.

During the Penal Law era, when practicing Catholicism was outlawed and priests went into hiding to defy the British government's order that they cease performing the sacraments, one or three lit candles in the window was an invitation to any passing priest to come and say mass with the family. If British officials questioned the candle practice, the 'welcome for the Holy Family' was a good cover story

- Michael J. Conconan, 83 (AOH), passed away Nov. 10, 2021. He was a graduate of Cathedral High School and Marian College. He taught business law. U.S. history and government at Scecina Memorial and Crispus Attucks high schools from the early 1960s through the mid-1970s. He coached high school football, basketball, and golf. One highlight of his time at Scecina was hosting a visit to the school by Bobby and Ethel Kennedy.

Mike was an avoid follower of politics. In the first election after the creation of Unigov (1971), Mike ran for a seat on the Indianapolis City-County Council. He worked for the Bureau of Motor Vehicles in the central office and as a branch manager, the Center Township Assessor's Office, the Salvation Army, and the Indianapolis bus company Metro.

À lifelong Indianapolis resident who proudly traced his Irish heritage in the city back to the 1840s, Mike was a member of Holy Cross, Little Flower, St. Simon, and Ss. Peter and Paul Cathedral parishes. He was a third-generation member of AOH.

Robert M. Lynch, (AOH) 83, passed away Dec. 1. He graduated from Sacred Heart H. S., served in the United States Air Force and earned a Bachelor's degree from Indiana University. Bob was married to the love of his life, Dorothy Jean "Dottie" (Woerdeman), who preceded him in death in 2013. He worked for Indiana National of 18-first with Conrail and finishing with Bank, retiring from Bank One as the Vice President of Operations.

Bob was a member of the K of C Council 3660 and the Bishop Chatard Assembly

245. He served as State Deputy, District Master and on the Indiana K of C Charities Fund Board for the Indiana State Council. It is now common to see the front windows of Irish homes lavishly decorated with several electrical candles and lights at Christmas time.

One other point to note is that by tradition the candle should be first lit by the voungest member of the family, and only extinguished by a girl named 'Mary'. Fortunately, in Ireland, particularly hundreds of years ago, a girl named Mary was never far away.

Today, the president's residence, Aras an Uachtarain, puts a candle in the window to express welcome to returning emigrants. It is also seen more broadly as a welcome to any traveler who needs a place to rest for the night, although today it isn't meant to be taken literally!
